U.S. TRADE (U.S. funds)

The U.S. cash cattle trade for last week, reported by the USDA Mandatory Price Report, listed live sales for the week from \$105.00-\$110.00 with steers averaging \$109.02 down \$0.89 from the previous week, while heifers averaged \$108.77 down \$1.22. On the rail prices ranged from \$168.00-\$174.00 dressed, with steers averaging \$172.78 down \$0.32 while heifers averaged \$172.94 down \$0.16 from the previous week on average. Today the market was quiet as both sides took inventory and new show lists were distributed. Asking prices are currently unestablished but trade is expected to develop by midweek in order to get it completed before the long weekend. This week's offering is mixed, with larger volumes in the south, steady in Colorado and fewer in Nebraska.

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
July 1st Cattle Inventories

The Ontario cattle inventories on July 1, 2018 were down 0.5% to 1.6 million head, the lowest since 1871. Provincial cattle numbers peaked in the 1960s and early 1970s but since then have been pressured lower with increased competition for land – from urban expansion and annual crops. After contracting from 1976 to 1993, inventories were relatively stable, fluctuating around 2.2 million head before contracting again starting in 2006.

Beef cow inventories were down 0.5% while dairy cows were up 0.9%. Between 1992 and 2009, Ontario had more beef cows than dairy. But since 2007, dairy cow inventories have been stable around 320,000 head; while beef cow inventories have dropped to 239,100 head representing 43% of total cows. Beef cows have stabilized since 2016 leaving total cow inventories at 558,200 head.


After the slight increase in dairy cows last year and this year, the reduction in dairy heifers for breeding would point towards a stable herd going into 2019.

Beef breeding heifers were up 3.3% on July 1st while historically low at 46,500 head. This represents 19.4% of beef cow numbers, which is inline with the relationship seen since 2016 when inventories stabilized and is the highest since 2002. There is no indication that breeding heifer numbers are large enough to support expansion. As weather conditions impact hay

supplies, beef cow numbers going into 2019 will be largely determined by culling rates this fall.



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The 2018 calf crop at 403,700 head is down 1.7% or 6,800 head. The steady decline in the calf crop over the last decade has increased reliance on calves imported from other provinces. Consequently, the supply of steers and slaughter heifers is relatively stable and should leave fed cattle marketings in the second half of 2018 similar to last year's levels.

The smaller calf crop will ensure there is competition by feedlots to fill pens this fall. Eastern cattle slaughter has averaged 624,000 head since 2012 with a range of 561-667,000 head. In 2018, slaughter is projected to be up 4% to 657,000 head to be the highest since 2012. Stabilizing eastern slaughter levels depends upon brining cattle into the region. - Brenna
